I write to you today with tremendous excitement and gratitude as we embark on a new chapter in our congregation's remarkable journey together.

Over the past fifteen years, we have witnessed extraordinary growth not just in numbers, but in the depth of our programming, the vibrancy of our community, and the sacred work we do together. Your commitment, energy, and passion have transformed Temple Judea into a beacon of excellence in the entire country. What happens every week at TJ is a rare scene in the story of Reform Judaism in the US. This growth is a blessing, and like all blessings, it calls us to respond with wisdom and foresight.

After careful deliberation with our leadership and our professional and clergy team, I am thrilled to share that we will be hiring a Co-Senior Rabbi to serve alongside me beginning in July of 2026.

And I have even more exciting news: we have identified an exceptional individual for this role.

Making Hanukkah Special

Hanukkah—with candles burning in the menorah, delicious latkes, chocolate gelt, and wooden dreidels—is a Jewish holiday filled with beloved symbols. Despite the time and attention, we devote to celebrating it, Hanukkah is, in fact, a minor holiday in the Jewish calendar. In fact, the detailed history of Judah and the Maccabees rebellion against the Syrian Greeks while defending Judaism against assimilation is not found in the Torah or in the Talmud, but in an outside canonical source, the Book of Maccabees from the Apocrypha. The Talmud asks, "What is Hanukkah?" and the explanation is a simple statement that when the Hasmonean dynasty prevailed against the Greeks, they sought to rededicate the Temple by kindling the menorah with purified oil. Yet they found only one small cruse of oil which contained sufficient oil for only one day's lighting. Yet a miracle occurred, and the oil was able to stay alight for eight days (from the Talmud).

How did the miracle occur, that a small amount of olive oil was able to burn for eight days? Rabbi Chaim Soloveitchik of Brisk, one of the most influential Talmudic scholars of the modern era, offered a fascinating answer: We must conclude that the miracle did not cause the *quantity* of the oil to increase. Rather, what happened was that the *quality* of the olive oil changed miraculously so that the original olive oil became more potent and burned more efficiently.

Herein lies a powerful message for us. Like the quantity of oil in that ancient cruse, there are many aspects of Hanukkah that are fixed - it falls near the winter solstice, it is celebrated over eight nights, and in our contemporary American context, it exists alongside a season of consumerism and gift-giving. These realities are beyond our control. What we can change, however, is the *quality* of our Hanukkah celebrations. We can be intentional about how we observe this festival and emphasize its spiritual message.

This shift from quantity to quality invites us to ask: What kind of light are we kindling during these eight nights? Are we simply going through familiar motions, or are we using this time to illuminate something deeper - our values, our connections, our commitment to Jewish life? Just as Rabbi Chaim taught us that the miracle was not about increasing the *quantity* of oil but enhancing its *quality*, so too can we transform our observance, making each night count not by how much we do, but by how mindfully and intentionally we kindle our celebrations.

So, what might this look like in practice? For example, many of us associate Hanukkah with gift-giving. And while it is fine to give gifts, remember that there is no biblical or rabbinic basis for giving gelt, the Yiddish word for money, or gifts on Hanukkah. The tradition of giving Hanukkah gelt began as an eighteenth-century Eastern European tradition of recognizing religious schoolteachers. It was not until the mid-twentieth

century in North America that gift-giving became a central part of Hanukkah celebrations owing to its proximity on the calendar to Christmas.

Beyond the gifts, one way to infuse your Hanukkah celebration with meaning is to focus on a different Jewish value during each of the eight nights of Hanukkah. No matter the number of members in your household, this practice can deepen your connection to the holiday's themes of perseverance, hope, and dedication. On the first night, you might contribute to a canned food drive or to a food pantry, exemplifying the Jewish value of feeding the hungry. On another night, you can make a phone call to a friend, relative, or congregant and brighten their day, fulfilling the mitzvah of spreading joy and happiness. On yet another night, reach out and say thank you to a former mentor, teacher, or friend, thereby demonstrating the mitzvah of gratitude. Other nights might focus on learning (studying a Jewish text), creativity (making Hanukkah crafts or cooking traditional foods), or tikkun olam (repairing the world through acts of justice and kindness).

The beauty of Rabbi Chaim's teaching about the oil is that it reminds us that miracles are not always about abundance, sometimes they are about quality. We need not create an elaborate, expensive, or exhausting Hanukkah to make it meaningful. Instead, we can take what we already have - our time, our traditions, our relationships - and kindle them with greater intention. In doing so, we become partners in the miracle, transforming the ordinary into the sacred, and allowing the light of Hanukkah to burn not just brighter, but with deeper purpose in our lives.

Did you know that song was written by a Jew?

With the winter Holidays right around the corner, 'tis the season to hear Christmas songs being played in seemingly every place we visit. From shopping malls to supermarkets, the sounds of "White Christmas", "Winter Wonderland" and "Chestnuts Roasting on an Open Fire" (among many others!) float through the air. It also gives way to one of my favorite activities: asking family and friends "**did you know that song was written by a Jew?**"

Yes! As many of us know, many well-known Christmas songs were written by Jews. But why?

Well, for a variety of reasons. The well-known "Let it Snow! Let it Snow! Let it Snow!" was written by Broadway powerhouse duo Sammy Cahn and Jule Styne in response to a major heat wave that was occurring in Los Angeles during 1945 (we Floridians can certainly relate). Cahn and Styne were children of Eastern European refugees, changed their names and moved far away from their homes making early Jewish life rituals challenging. Some speculate this was even an attempt for them to assimilate more into their new community and home.

Some Jews composed Christmas songs to not only earn income and support themselves as working composers, but also to express themselves and shed light on personal matters. Johnny Marks and his brother-in-law Robert May, well-known for many Christmas hits including "Rudolph the Red-Nose Reindeer", "Rockin' Around the Christmas Tree", and "A Holly Jolly Christmas", used their compositions to shed light on unique Jewish experiences. When asked to compose a "cheery Christmas story" by his employer at the time, May drew on his own childhood which he described as growing up as a "shy" and "small" Jewish boy. He empathized with "underdogs" and knew what it was like to be one. It helped him create the ultimate underdog character: Rudolph the Red-Nose Reindeer! A character that was too small to help Santa deliver presents but helped one foggy evening with his glowing red nose, his own unique superpower. Marks later set this story to the cheery Christmas tune we recognize today.

Some Christmas songs don't carry such a story but are equally impressive. "Santa Claus is Coming to Town", music written by J. Fred Coots took just 10 minutes to compose!

Whatever the reason may be, the representation of Jews in Christmas song repertoire is just another shining example of our tenacity, our talents, and our *chutzpah*. We are able time and time again to turn tragedy into triumph, to use our talents wisely and creatively and to find unique ways to express ourselves. Our unique experiences are what shape us, and like Rudolph's Red Nose they are our "superpower".

As you find yourselves out and about the next few weeks, stop and pause to listen to what's being played and then proudly ask a friend or family member: **did you know that song was written by a Jew?**

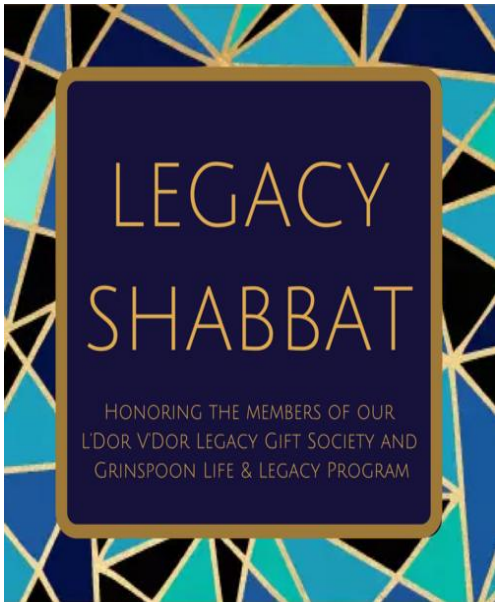

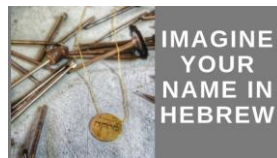

Sacred Transitions: Jewish Perspectives on End-of-Life Decisions

- **Cremation and Burial Practices:** Examine traditional Jewish burial customs, the theological and practical concerns regarding cremation, and how different Jewish movements approach these questions today.

Throughout the session, Rabbi Yaron will weave together ancient wisdom with practical guidance for navigating these profound life transitions with dignity, meaning, and Jewish values. Participants will have opportunities to ask questions and discuss how these teachings might inform their own decision-making processes. Class size is limited.

(the beginning of the new month).**

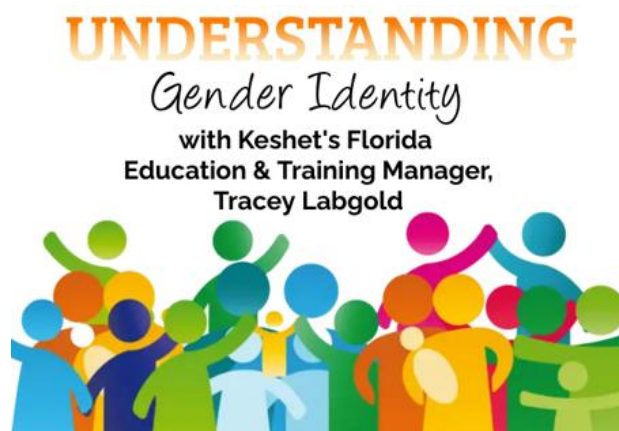

PEACE/Temple Judea Update

Temple Judea's membership in P.E.A.C.E. (People Engaged In Active Community Efforts) is grounded in our commitment to social justice and a responsibility for addressing the concerns that affect our neighbors.

Our PEACE community outreach began in September when we met twice to listen and discuss issues we've seen affect neighbors around us. We then shared our concerns with PEACE's other 26 congregations and from many community problems, three stood out: immigration, healthcare and the cost of living.

Temple Judea was well represented at the Community Problems Assembly where we each had a vote to decide which issue PEACE will address. This year's community issue will be **immigration**.

The next step is research that will delve into what this problem looks like in Palm Beach County and what can realistically be done to make life better for our neighbors who are immigrants. PEACE will also continue to focus on affordable housing and access to mental health services.

Attending the Community Problems Assembly showed us the power of many congregations working together for social justice. Key Palm Beach County political representatives committed their support, and the Healthcare District confirmed they will work with PEACE to achieve the goal of increased access to mental health services.

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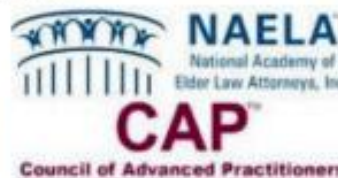
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
