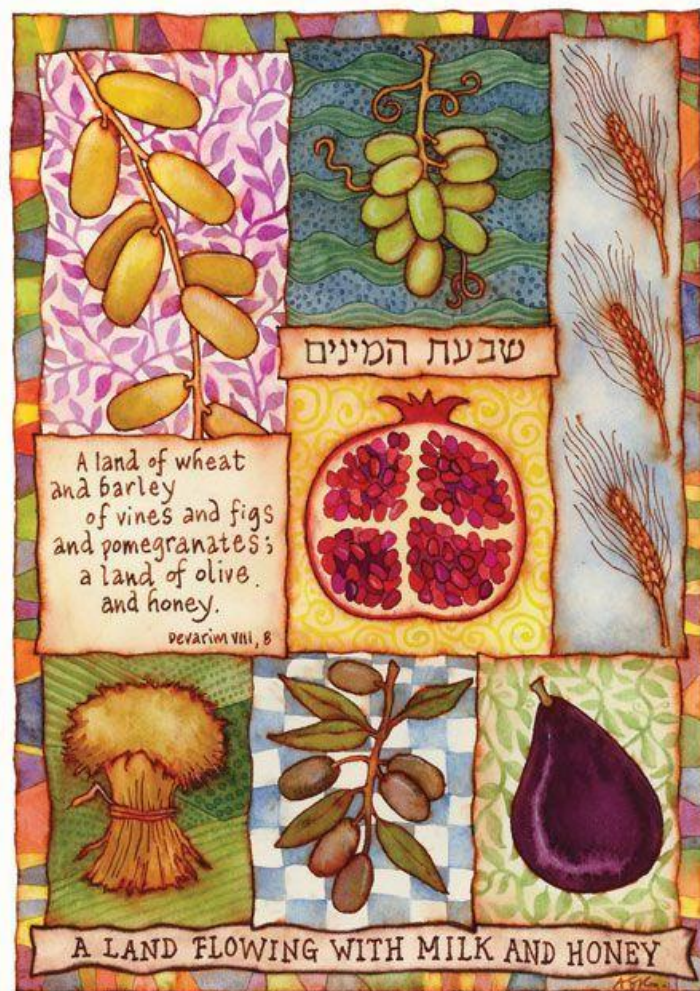

*As has become a TJ tradition, Pastor Samuel St. Fleur spoke at Temple on Friday, January 17<sup>th</sup> and on Sunday, January 14<sup>th</sup> Rabbi Yaron gave the sermon at Christ Family Worship Assembly in Riviera Beach both sermons in honor of the memory of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. This year Pastor St. Fleur and Rabbi Yaron decided to focus on what brings us together vs. what differentiates us. Pastor St. Fleur spoke about “What he admires about Judaism” and Rabbi Yaron spoke about “What he admires about Christianity?”*

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Once again, it is an honor to stand before you today in this sacred space, with this sacred congregation.

I love our tradition in which Pastor Samuel, and I have the privilege of sharing our words with each other's congregation in honor of the legacy of Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

This year Pastor Samuel and I decided that we will share with each other's congregation what we admire and love about each other's faith.

We believe that this year, more than ever before, it is crucial that we recognize and proclaim the profound connection between our faith traditions.

This year, more than ever before, we believe that we need to use this special weekend, not to focus on our differences but rather on the shared values that unite us and inspire us to work for a world redeemed by love, justice, and peace.

On Friday night Pastor Samuel shared with Temple Judea three things he admires about Judaism, he shared his admiration in our mission statement of a “Joyous Judaism that Inspires Action”, his love of the meaning Judaism gives to ritual and the importance it gives to storytelling.

Being that I am a competitive person, I decided I will share with you not three but rather **four** aspects of Christianity that I deeply admire.

As you will shortly see, for each of these aspects I wanted to share a quote from the scriptures, I wanted to show how this teaching inspired MLK and I wanted to remind my own congregation, that these values are rooted in ancient Jewish teaching, after all, both Jesus and Paul had Jewish mothers, they both drew their inspiration and wisdom from Jewish tradition and wisdom, as i like to say, Jesus was and still is the greatest Reform rabbi that ever lived. And while we share these values and principles, I stand here today and share with you - that you are doing them better than us, and that we can learn from your devotion and commitment to these values.

So, what are the four aspects?

First, I am inspired by Christianity's commitment to the prophetic tradition. This tradition, rooted in the Hebrew Bible and carried forward by Christian teachings, reminds us that faith is not merely about personal salvation but about transforming the world. The prophets of old—Amos, Isaiah, and Jeremiah—spoke about justice with a boldness that transcended their time.

And Jesus echoed their teachings in his own words: he amplified the call to build a kingdom of justice and compassion on earth. In Luke 4:18-19, Jesus said: "The lord has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free."

Dr. King stood firmly in this tradition, echoing these ancient voices as he declared, "Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere." And he quoted the ancient prophets in his "I Have a Dream" speech, "We will not be satisfied until justice rolls down like waters and righteousness like a mighty stream."

In the Talmud, we are taught, "Whoever saves a single life is considered to have saved the whole world" (Sanhedrin 37a). This teaching underscores the sacredness of justice and the transformative power of individual action.

Today, I honor Christianity's deep embrace of this prophetic mission, a mission that speaks to the very heart of what it means to be human. It calls us to step beyond the walls of our sanctuaries and into the streets, where the cries of the marginalized demand our attention. It challenges us to live out our faith in tangible ways, to be God's partners in repairing the brokenness of the world—a concept we call *tikkun olam*.

The second aspect of Christianity I deeply admire is its unwavering commitment to love and service. I love the word "ministry." I love the idea that when you are part of a church what defines you maybe more than any other thing is your "ministry" - what you do for others. We do not have an equivalent word in Hebrew.

I admire the idea that spirituality is demonstrated not just by meditation or prayer but rather in service for others.

In the Jewish tradition we cherish the commandment to "love your neighbor (or fellow) as yourself." We teach it time after time.

Yet this Jewish commandment and principle finds its fullest expression in Christian teachings. For example, in Jesus's call in John 13:34, "A new command I give you: love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." Jesus demands that we extend this love not just to those who are close, or we love but rather- even to our enemies.

Dr. King exemplified this ethic in his life and work. His dream of a "beloved community" was grounded in the belief that love and service have the power to overcome hate and division. As he said, "Life's most persistent and urgent question is: 'What are you doing for others?'"

The Talmud reminds us, "The world stands on three things: on Torah, on worship, and on acts of lovingkindness" (Pirkei Avot 1:2).

When we act in love, we are reminded that we are all interconnected, bound together in a single garment of destiny. I admire this Christian commitment to love that manifested itself in acts of service; in having a "ministry", I admire the idea that there is no real way to live out our values rather than through acts of compassion and justice.

The third aspect I deeply admire is the resilience of Christian faith, particularly as it has been lived out in the Black church. The Black church has been a beacon of hope and a sanctuary of strength for countless generations. In the face of unspeakable suffering—slavery, segregation, systemic injustice—the Black church has stood as a testament to the unyielding power of faith.

Through its hymns, prayers, and sermons, the Black church has proclaimed a theology of liberation, one that refuses to accept oppression as the final word. It is a faith that declares, "We shall overcome," even when the path forward is steep and uncertain.

This resilience is a profound act of spiritual defiance, a refusal to let darkness extinguish the light. As Paul wrote in 2 Corinthians 4:8-9, "We are hard pressed on every side, but not crushed; perplexed, but not in despair; persecuted, but not abandoned; struck down, but not destroyed."

As Dr. King reminded us, "We must accept finite disappointment, but never lose infinite hope."

In the Talmud, we are taught, "Even if a sword is placed upon your neck, do not despair of divine mercy" (Berakhot 10a).

As a Jew, I find deep kinship in this resilience. Our people, too, have known exile, persecution, and struggle. Yet, like the Black church, we have held fast to the belief that redemption is always possible, that hope can never be extinguished. This shared resilience is a testament to the enduring power of faith to sustain and uplift us, even in our darkest hours.

Finally, I am moved by Christianity's call to community. From the earliest days of the church, community has been at the heart of Christian life. The Acts of the Apostles paints a beautiful picture of believers sharing everything in common, ensuring that no one is in need. As it is written in Acts 4:32, "All the believers were one in heart and

mind. No one claimed that any of their possessions was their own, but they shared everything they had."

In the Christian tradition, community is not just about proximity; it is about relationship, mutual support, and accountability. It is about bearing one another's burdens and rejoicing in one another's joys.

Dr. King's vision of the beloved community challenges us to create a world where every person is valued, where justice prevails, and where peace reigns. As he said, "I have decided to stick with love. Hate is too great a burden to bear."

The Talmud teaches us, "All of Israel is responsible for one another" (Shevuot 39a). This principle underscores the sacred duty to build a caring and interconnected community. It is a powerful reminder that none of us can walk the path of faith alone. We are called to be our brothers' and sisters' keepers, to build bridges of understanding and solidarity. In a world that so often seeks to divide us, Christianity's call to community is a beacon of hope and unity.

As we honor Dr. King's legacy today, let us remember that his dream was not his alone. It is a dream rooted in the shared values of our faiths, a dream that calls us to work together for a world redeemed by justice, love, and peace. Let us draw strength from the prophetic tradition, from the ethic of love and service, from the resilience of faith, and from the call to community.

So having shared what we love so much about each other and having been reminded of how much we have in common, today- let us recommit ourselves to building the beloved community Dr. King envisioned, where every person is treated with dignity and respect.

Let us reflect on these shared principles and celebrate the profound potential for Judaism and Christianity to learn from and support one another.

Let us celebrate our differences while also holding fast to our traditions that are bound by a shared commitment to justice, compassion, and the sanctity of human dignity.

May we go forth inspired by the teachings of our traditions and by the example of those who have walked this path before us. May we be builders of bridges, healers of wounds, and bearers of light in a world in need. And may we honor Dr. King's legacy not just with our words but with our lives. Amen.

Shalom Temple Judea,

As I write this, the horrific fires in Los Angeles continue to rage. Unsurprisingly, in this moment of unbelievable stress and uncertainty, folks have been pointing their fingers left and right. While just briefly “doomscrolling” on social media, I saw examples of folks blaming government leaders as well as others blaming climate change. With the celebration of Tu B’shevat on February 13th this year, I decided to investigate the issue of climate change as it relates to these fires. While Tu B’shevat is traditionally the “birthday of the trees,” it’s also known as the “Jewish Earth Day” and provides us a perfect opportunity to explore the intersection of Jewish values with our very pressing current environmental concerns.

According to my research from several politically wide-ranging news sources: while climate change doesn’t seem to be the primary factor that led to these fires (the primary factor being the “perfect storm” of weather and climate conditions, such as Santa Ana wind gusts up to 100 mph and low humidity), it definitely helped lay the groundwork for the severity of these fires. In recent years, wildfires in that area of the country have grown in size and severity overall due to climate change that, according the Fifth National Climate Assessment, “has produced warmer and drier conditions with prolonged droughts that lead to the accumulation of dry vegetation, which has also increased due to worsening extreme heat events and prolonged droughts.”

According to the RAC (the Reform Movement’s Religious Action Center), our Jewish values call on us to advocate for our precious environment- by doing so- we carry on a Jewish tradition of stewardship and partnership in the continuing work of Creation dating back to the first chapters of the Torah. Both our modern and ancient rabbis argue that, since God created the Earth, then it follows that we must honor God by protecting God’s sacred creation. While California might be very far away, what’s happening in California affects all of us- not just in Florida but throughout the world.

As Rabbi Shimon bar Yochai teaches in Leviticus Rabbah, “One should compare this to people together in a boat, one of whom took a drill and began to drill a hole beneath himself. His companions said to him: Why are you doing this? He replied: What concern is it of yours? Am I not drilling under myself? They replied: But you will flood the boat for us all!”

2024 was the hottest year in recorded history, which should not surprise us- after all, the previous hottest year was 2023. All 10 of the hottest years on record have come in the last decade. The hole in the boat in California affects us as well- climate change is a key reason why hurricanes here on the East Coast have become more and more destructive. Hurricanes are becoming stronger faster, because Hurricanes are fueled by warm water and humid air, which as increased with climate change. Shifting atmosphere and ocean conditions from climate change – caused by heat-trapping gases emitted from human activities – are making hurricane season even worse for Floridians, a phenomenon known as rapid intensification. According to the Environmental Defense Fund,

“The good news is that we know what is causing climate change. Greenhouse gas emissions from human activities are the leading cause, and the reality is that Florida is one of the top greenhouse gas-emitting U.S. states. We need to take immediate actions to reduce our emissions of greenhouse

gases in order to slow down and limit warming in the coming decades and ultimately stabilize global temperatures.”

How can we, as individuals, limit our greenhouse gases? I’ve included a list of action items below - and I encourage our Temple Judea community, as we prepare to welcome in the New Year for the Trees, to make one “New Year’s Resolution” to limit our individual carbon emissions this year. I look forward to learning about your choices as we all strive to live lives inspired by the teachings of our Torah, our “Tree of Life!”

**\*Eat low on the food chain.** This means eating mostly fruits, veggies, grains, and beans. Livestock—meat and dairy—is responsible for 14.5 percent of manmade global greenhouse gas emissions. You can start by joining the Meatless Mondays movement.

**\*Eat less dairy-** might be good advice for Jews in general! But also, an Oxford University study shows that reducing your dairy intake is one of the greatest ways you can reduce your carbon footprint.

*\*Choose organic and local foods that are in season. Transporting food from far away, whether by truck, ship, rail or plane, uses fossil fuels for fuel and for cooling to keep foods in transit from spoiling.*

**\*Consider buying a Lomi tabletop composter** (we LOVE ours!) to reduce your food garbage and to create wonderful soil, found on Lomi.com.

**\*Bring your own reusable bags** when you shop and try to avoid items with excess packaging.

**\*Give up hand washing your dishes.** Though it may be tempting to give your dishes a rinse before tossing them in the dishwasher, it’s actually more environmentally friendly to just scrape off any excess food, make sure the dishwasher is full before each use, and run it on the economy setting.

**\*Keep your greens...green!** You know those plastic produce bags at the grocery store? You don’t actually need them! You can forgo the bags altogether or purchase reusable ones.

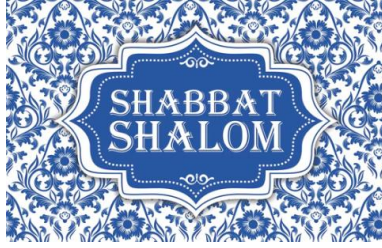

## **Israel's Shifting Strategic Landscape: A Frontline Perspective**

Lt. Col. (Res.) Avital Leibovich has been the Director of AJC Jerusalem since 2014. Since the October 7 attack by Hamas, she has served several tours of active military service in Israel's Northern Command. Lt. Col. Leibovich is an expert in Middle East and Balkan diplomacy and in geopolitical strategy, working closely with ambassadors and diplomats in Israel and abroad. She is the first Israeli to be awarded the title of Knight of the Order of Scanderbeg by the President of Albania in honor of her work promoting relations between Israel and Albania. Her distinguished career spans over 20 years in a wide range of senior media and public relations positions within the Israel Defense Forces (IDF). As Head of the IDF Foreign Press Branch, she appeared in thousands of media interviews, serving as the face of the IDF to the international community during critical events such as the 'Cast Lead' and 'Pillar of Defense' operations, Gilad Shalit's return, and many others. She later created and led the Interactive Media Branch of the IDF Spokesperson's Unit in response to the rapidly growing influence of social networks and internet platforms in the media world. Avital is widely regarded as a keen analyst of Israel's strategic and military landscape. Lt. Col. Leibovich received a BA in English Literature and Political Science from Bar Ilan University and an MA in International Relations from University of Haifa, as well as a diploma in Spokesmanship, Communications, and Public Relations from the Department of Foreign Affairs at Bar Ilan University.

Rabbi Geoffrey A. Mitelman is the Founding Director of Sinai and Synapses, an organization that bridges the scientific and religious worlds, and is being incubated at Clal – The National Jewish Center for Learning and Leadership.

His work has been supported by the John Templeton Foundation, Emanuel J. Friedman Philanthropies, and the Lucius N. Littauer Foundation, and his writings about the intersection of religion and science have been published in the books *Seven Days, Many Voices* and *A Life of Meaning* (both published by the CCAR press) and *These Truths We Hold* (published by HUC Press) as well as on *The Huffington Post*, *Nautilus*, *Orbiter*, *The Wisdom Daily*, *Jewish Telegraphic Agency*, and *My Jewish Learning*. He has been an adjunct professor at both the Hebrew Union College – Jewish Institute of Religion and the Academy for Jewish Religion, and is an internationally sought-out teacher, presenter, and scholar-in-residence.

He was ordained by the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, where he received the Cora Kahn Prize from the Cincinnati faculty for the most outstanding sermon delivery and oratory. An alumnus of Princeton University, he received multiple prizes for outstanding scholarship in Biblical and Judaic studies. He was selected to be a member of the first cohort of Clal's prestigious Rabbis Without Borders fellowship, a national program that seeks to position rabbis as American religious leaders and spiritual innovators who contribute Jewish wisdom to the American spiritual landscape.

From 2007 to 2014, he served as Assistant and then Associate Rabbi of Temple Beth El of Northern Westchester, and he appeared on *Jeopardy!*

Miriam Anzovin is a visual artist, writer, content creator, and massive Jewish nerd, exploring the juxtaposition of pop culture, nerd culture, and Jewish culture.

Some of her popular short-form video series include #DafReactions, #ParshaReactions, #JewishHolidayReactions, #JewishBookReactions, #AVeryJewishMakeupTutorial, the “Elder Millennials of Zion” skits, and more content on Jewish themes and ideas.

In The Daf Reactions Project, she shares her practice of daily study of the Babylonian Talmud in the Daf Yomi cycle from the viewpoint of a formerly Orthodox, now secular, Millennial feminist. The videos are her authentic reactions, with commentary both heartfelt and comedic, putting ancient discourse in direct communication with modern internet culture, pop culture, and current events.

Her role in her work is not as a teacher, nor as a rabbi, but rather as a fellow learner, a fellow traveler, on the path of Jewish discovery. Through her videos, writing, and art, she invites others to walk beside her on this journey and connect with Jewish teachings in ways that are relatable and personally meaningful to them.

Miriam was the first Artist in Residence at Moishe House and was previously the host of The Vibe of the Tribe podcast. She is currently represented for speaking engagements by Jewish Speakers Bureau, and The Daf Reactions Project is a grateful grantee partner of Lippman Kanfer Foundation for Living Torah.

Miriam will speak openly about how her life experiences as a formerly Orthodox woman, and now secular Jew, led her to deep emotional engagement with Jewish text study. She will discuss her spiritual journey, Daf Yomi, the genesis of her viral TikTok videos, and being a “Talmud Influencer” in the public eye.
