“The test of a preacher is that his congregation goes away saying not, ‘What a lovely sermon,’ but, ‘I will do something!’ ” ~ *Francis de Sales*

While it might make little sense to you, I feel a great sense of satisfaction when you enjoy my sermons and feel inspired by them as much as I do as when my sermons cause you to feel disturbed, uncomfortable, and to question, or even object to my message. But above all – I feel the best when a sermon inspires you to do something.

Therefore, more than ever before, I was moved by those of you who called, texted, or emailed me to say how much you loved, or disagreed, with my High Holy Day messages. And I would like to use this opportunity to share with you, in more depth, my reasoning for these sermons and the actual action items I was hoping you might take away with you.

If I had to summarize the key message of all four sermons – summarized in one word – that word would be legacy. (In case you missed them please know that they are available on our website www.gotj.org/worship/sermons.)

We started on Erev Rosh Hashanah with Rabbi Feivel Strauss, telling you a little bit more about himself, his dreams, and his visions for Temple Judea, and about his path to the rabbinate. It was a chance for him to share with us where he came from, who he is and where he sees us going in the future. For many of you it was your first opportunity to get to know Rabbi Feivel who I hope will be here with us for many years to come.

On Rosh Hashanah morning, I spoke about how we can become our best selves, mainly through the idea of conquering or taming our evil inclination. Understanding the concept of the evil inclination, which exists in each and every one of us, and is the driving power that can turn anything good in us into evil. Judaism teaches that our ability to control our inclinations determines what kind of people we are going to be. Recognizing and controlling our evil inclination will determine if we will be fast to anger or fast to forgive, if we will be generous or not, if we will be caring just for ourselves or also for others.

My call to action was asking you to answer the question AYECHA? Where are you spiritually and morally? Where are areas in your life that you have given the Yetzer Ha’ra too much freedom – be it in humility, generosity, anger, ego, seeking to avoid conflict, etc. There is no one among us who cannot find a place where this inclination has taken the best away from him or her.

On Kol Nidre we talked about what it means to have enough. Because only when we have enough can we share what is more than enough with others. And what we can share with others is a big part of the legacy we will leave behind us. My main argument in this sermon was that I truly believe we all have more than enough, and that it is not the role of government or regulators to tell us how much is enough – but rather – it is upon each and every one of us to answer that question for themselves. At what point does having more wealth stop making us happier, and truly understanding that what makes us happier than anything else is our ability to help, to give, to make a difference, to change a person’s life? I stressed time after time that I am not against having wealth or growing your wealth – all I asked of you is to ask yourselves is how much is enough for you to be happy and how do you

increase your happiness not just by growing your wealth but by using it to make a meaningful difference in our world?

And it is hard to answer this question without listening to the voice of our Yetzer Ha'ra that tries to convince us we need much more than what we have.

My call to action was asking you to evaluate what the word enough means to you. What is your “financial happiness point?” What is the point where you realize that having more doesn't add to your happiness but rather that helping more does?

And finally, the letter to my great-great-grandchildren on Yom Kippur which was about what kind of a world are we going to leave them. Through examination of the concepts of *teshuvah*, *tefilah* and *tzedakah* I hopefully offered us a path to think about what kind of ancestors are we going to be.

My call to action was to move past the idea of simple recycling and conserving energy. It was a call for us to understand that this battle cannot be won without serious sacrifices from all of us. That it has to be a battle that takes place on a global political level, and that when we weigh the value of watching out for our future and that of our great grandchildren versus our own comfort, our own needs (or wants) cannot come first. And that making this change will come with a price. We have to realize that we ourselves are the only ones that can put a limit to what we have, use, need and want – and that if we do not do so NOW – we might have a lot of wealth to leave our future descendants, but they will not have a world in which they will be able to enjoy any of it.

Among other things I invited you to join our Temple's DAYENU group –which is part of a movement of American Jews confronting the climate crisis with spiritual audacity and bold political action. The goal of the group is to educate ourselves and others about legislation regarding the environment, both on local and national level and to mobilize Jewish support for climate solutions, raising up a spiritual, religious, and moral voice. Just call the temple office and ask to add your name to the list – we will start meeting in the fall.

I realize that even after reading this article – you might have reservations, questions, concerns or objections to all or some of my message – I hope you know me well enough to know that I will welcome with open arms and a good cup of coffee and a request to meet personally and discuss this more.

I truly hope that each and every one of us could find at least one idea that you are able to implement into your lives – if any of my words, made you make any change, small or big, for the better – I can honestly say thank you from the bottom of my heart for being open to my words.

May we all be inscribed and sealed in the book of a life well lived.

p.s. Joe is one of Cantor Abbie's dear friends – and how Temple Judea got connected with Abbie!

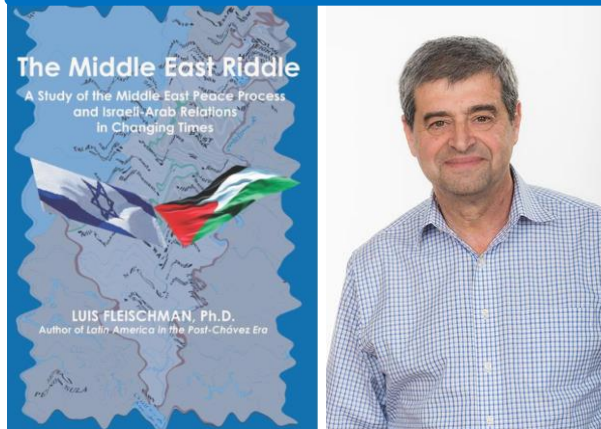

Celebrating Jewish Rituals

1. Introduction to ritual: How do we define it and the role it plays in our lives. How are rituals created and why do some survive better than others?
2. From conception to birth - What is the Jewish approach to the question of when life starts? Abortion? IVF treatments? Surrogate parents? Adoption? What does our tradition have to say about how many children should we have? All these and more questions about life itself.
3. From birth to childhood and beyond - How do we feel about circumcision? And how do we welcome girls into the covenant of Abraham and Sarah? Have you ever heard of a ceremony called Upsherin? Why Girls at 12 and boys at 13 - who's idea was it anyways? And the role confirmation plays in our tradition.
4. Jewish adulthood – Let us have a better understanding of the Jewish marriage rituals as well as issues of divorce. What does Jewish ritual have to offer us as we grow older - from affixing a mezuzah to door of our first home to celebrating an 80th birthday.
5. Beyond life - there is such beauty and wisdom in Jewish ritual concerning death and mourning, rituals that will push us to confront the question of what happens to us after we die.
6. Creating new rituals - we will examine together some of the more exciting innovations in the world of Jewish ritual and join our minds together as we try to develop our own new Jewish rituals.

JUDAISM 2.0 with RABBI YARON via Zoom

1. **God** - in these 4 sessions we will explore different philosophies of Jewish thinkers about who/what is God - From Buber's "I and Thou" to Humanistic Judaism, from Maimonides 13 principles of belief to Mordechai Kaplan's ideas that gave birth to Reconstructionist Judaism. (10/6; 10/20; 11/3; 11/17)
2. **History** : In these 4 Sessions we will follow the 4 great revolutions of Jewish traditions and come to understand the continuous changing nature of Judaism. We will explore the period of 1st and 2nd temple, the period following the destruction of the Temple and the rise of Rabbinic Judaism and the writing of Talmud and conclude with the rise of kabbalistic and progressive Judaism in the 18-21st century. (1/5; 1/19; 2/2; 2/16)
3. **The Jewish Bookshelf** : In these 3 sessions we will open and better understand some of the more known and less known treasures that can be found in a classic Jewish library- from understanding how the Tanach (bible came to be) to who were the people that wrote the books of the prophets. We will try to understand the writings of Maimonides and the epic works of A.J. Heschel as well as acquaint ourselves with modern Israeli poets and authors. (3/2; 3/23; 4/6)
4. **Sacred celebrations**: These 3 sessions are dedicated to a deeper understanding of the most well-known Jewish holidays - we will try to understand the historic context of each holiday, the rationale for the traditions and laws as well as follow the evolution of our holidays, Shabbat, High Holy Days, Passover and all the rest! (4/27; 5/11; 5/25)

A four-part series focusing on exploring Judaism through three lenses: Self, Soul and Text. These three are pillars on which our Jewish identity stands. This class is a journey to uncover new perspectives of our Jewish practice - culminating the year with a new-found relationship with our self, soul, and Jewish texts. 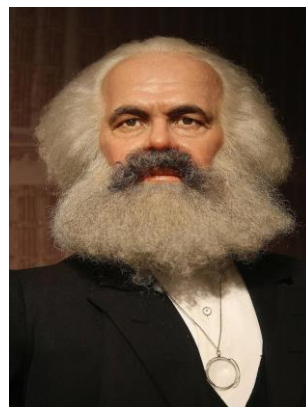

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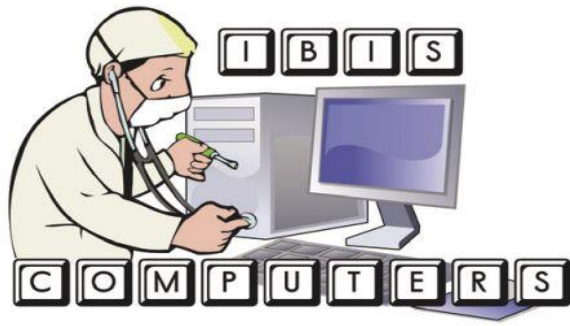
