# *Never Too Busy: An Invitation from Your Rabbi*

---

There's a phrase I hear more often than I'd like: "I wanted to reach out, but I thought you were too busy."

Every time someone says this to me, my heart sinks a little. I understand the intention behind it- people are being considerate, not wanting to add to what they perceive as an overwhelming schedule. But I need to be honest with you: when you tell me you didn't contact me because you thought I was too busy, it actually hurts.

Here's why: Being a rabbi isn't about having an empty calendar. It's about knowing how to fill it with what matters most. And you- your joys, your struggles, your questions, your celebrations, your grief - you matter most.

Yes, my days are full. On any given day, I might lead morning minyan, teach an adult education class, meet with a couple planning their wedding, visit someone in the hospital, check in by phone with a member recovering at home from surgery, lead a shiva, officiate at a funeral, represent the Temple in a meeting at the Jewish federation, plan programs for next year, prepare a shabbat service, welcome new members to our community, attend staff meetings, prepare a sermon, and respond to dozens of emails. Between Hebrew school and Temple life, meetings and lifecycle events, pastoral conversations and community gatherings - my days are always full.

But "full" doesn't mean "too busy." It means engaged, present, active in the sacred work I've been called to do.

When you assume I'm too busy for you, you're essentially saying you don't think I can prioritize. But prioritization isn't just something rabbis can do - it's fundamental to the work they do. I am blessed to serve as your rabbi. After fifteen years at Temple Judea, I can tell you without hesitation that this is the most beautiful, exhausting and rewarding work possible. There's something deeply meaningful about walking with people through every season of their lives - from baby namings to funerals, from moments of doubt to moments

of transcendent joy. Every day brings something different, and while that makes for a full calendar, it makes for a rich and purposeful life.

So please, let me be clear: Contact me. Call, email, text, stop me after services. If it matters to you, it matters to me. If you need to talk, I want to hear. If you have a question, I want to help you find an answer. If you're celebrating, I want to celebrate with you. If you're struggling, I want to walk alongside you.

And here's something else: I'll meet you where you are. You don't have to come to the Temple to see me. Maybe you're not someone who comes to services regularly - that's okay. Meet me at your club for lunch. Let's grab coffee at Prosecco. I'm happy to play pickleball with you or go for a walk. More times than not, the most meaningful conversations happen not in my office, but over a casual meal or cup of coffee. The setting doesn't matter - what matters is the connection. You don't always have to come to meet me where I am; I'm more than willing to meet you where you are.

Now, I do need to mention one exception. Friday nights after services, when I'm trying to say Shabbat Shalom to hundreds of people, is probably not the best time to discuss Temple business or share personal matters that need my full attention. It's not that I don't care - it's that in that moment, I simply don't have the capacity to remember everything that's being shared with me. I want to give you the attention you deserve, and I can't do that while greeting the entire congregation. But here's the thing: even then, you can always send me a text or leave me a message, and I will get back to you.

I may not always be immediately available at the exact moment you reach out- that's the reality of a full life. But I will get back to you. I will make time. I will prioritize you, because that's what being your rabbi means.

The next time you find yourself thinking, "I should reach out to Rabbi Yaron, but he's probably too busy," I want you to finish that thought differently: "I should reach out to Rabbi Yaron, because this matters to me, and therefore it will matter to him."

Because it will.

# Retelling Our Story: From the Women's Seder to Our Seder Tables

With spring almost here and Passover quickly approaching, we are reminded of the commandment: “And you will explain to your child on that day, ‘It is because of what the Lord did for me when I went free from Egypt’” (Exodus 13:8). This mitzvah of remembering was not meant only for the generation of the Exodus, but for every generation that follows. And the goal is not simply to repeat the story—it is to tell it in a way that can be heard - and lived.

One of the most powerful examples of this kind of retelling is the story of the Women's Seder.

Imagine a spring evening in 1975 in Haifa, Israel. The novelist and playwright E. M. Broner and the Israeli social worker and activist Naomi Nimrod hosted a different kind of Seder—one in which traditional gender roles would not determine who cooked and who led. Each woman would do both. What began as an evening around a table became something much larger: a renewed way for women to see themselves inside the Passover story. In the months that followed, Broner and Nimrod studied sources and wrote new text, and what emerged was *The Women's Haggadah*—a work that helped reshape how countless Jews experience Passover. By 1976 the first formal Women's Seder was held, and word spread quickly. Jewish women began gathering, adding their voices, and making room for what had too often been missing. As Letty Cottin Pogrebin recalled Broner: “She made room for us at the table by creating a whole new one—a Seder table at which women's voices were heard.” The Women's Seder opened doors—spiritual, communal, and Jewish—that many had never felt fully open before. Today, Women's Seders take place across the world in synagogues and Jewish institutions.

That is part of the wisdom of the Seder itself. It is not a museum exhibit. It is a living ritual—built to be carried forward, translated into the language of each generation.

Rabbi Leon Morris, President of the Pardes Institute in Jerusalem, teaches a beautiful insight about the Torah's two versions of the story of the spies. In the Book of Numbers, Moses tells the story with an emphasis on God's role. Thirty-eight years later, in Deuteronomy, when a new generation stands on the banks of the Jordan, preparing to cross over and build a future in the land, Moses emphasizes the role of the people—their courage, their responsibility, their faith—because the future will depend on them. Moses adapts the story so the next generation can hear what they most need to hear.

Today, in the aftermath of October 7th, there is a need to tell our story again—our peoplehood, our connection to Israel, and the values that bind us to one another.

And so, I want to propose a simple exercise for your Seder this year. During *Maggid*—the telling of the story—go a little off script. Go around the table and tell the Jewish story in your own words. Let each person add a “chapter.” Invite everyone to share a moment in Jewish history that speaks to them: a memory, a family story, a teacher, a place, a turning point—something that helps them name what it means to belong to the Jewish people.

As we tell the story, remember: the Mishnah instructs us to begin with *g’nut* (degradation) and end with *shevach* (praise). Our retelling may include trial and tribulation, but it should also lift up the impact of Jewish values in the world—values that make us, in the words of the prophet Isaiah, a light unto the nations. The Talmud teaches that when the angels began singing as the Egyptians drowned in the sea, God rebuked them: “My creatures are drowning, and you sing praises?” Even in triumph, we do not abandon compassion.

We express that compassion at our Seder when we spill drops of wine for each plague—diminishing our cup of joy because we remember that all human beings are created in the image of God.

The journey from slavery to freedom, and the long Jewish return to the Land of Israel over two thousand years later, are threads of a single unfolding story—one that begins in the Haggadah and continues in every generation. It has included struggle, suffering, and sometimes unimaginable loss. And still, the ideas carried in the heart of the Jewish people—equality, a yearning for peace, empathy and compassion, pursuit of justice, and a lifelong pursuit of learning—remain part of what makes us an eternal people.

This year, as we gather for our Women’s Seder here at Temple Judea on March 18 and again around our tables on April 1, may we remember that the Seder invites more than recitation. It invites renewal. May we tell the story in a way that speaks to this moment, to this generation, and to the world we hope to help build.

Wishing you and your loved ones a joyful and meaningful Pesach — may your seder be filled with laughter, your matzah with purpose, and your hearts with the enduring hope of freedom.

# *In Her Own Voice: Celebrating Jewish Women in Music*

On Sunday, March 8th, 2026, we celebrate International Women's Day! At Temple Judea, we continue to celebrate women in various ways. I'm proud of our recent Shabbatot services, which highlighted two Jewish women pioneers in music — Debbie Friedman and Barbra Streisand.

The music world has been graced with so many phenomenal Jewish women composers throughout the years — composers who have defied industry norms time and again, who have made their female and Jewish identity an integral part of their artistic process, and who have refused to be anything other than who they were.

In honor of International Women's Day, I'd like to share three Jewish women composers with you. I'm sure you'll have heard of at least one of them, but if the others are new to you, I encourage you to take some time to listen to their music. I've also included notable tracks that highlight their very unique talents!

**Carole King:** Born in Manhattan to Jewish parents, Carole King is one of the most celebrated singer-songwriters in popular music. She and Gerry Goffin became one of the most celebrated songwriting duos of the 1960s. Her music includes melodies that are musically rich and deeply memorable, and her lyrics are filled with vivid storytelling. She always strived to present herself as exactly who she was. Notable tracks include: "You've Got a Friend," "Tapestry," "It's Too Late," and "(You Make Me Feel Like) A Natural Woman."

**Regina Spektor:** Born in the Soviet Union in 1980, Regina Spektor and her family emigrated to the United States after facing antisemitism. An accomplished pianist who studied classical music, Spektor later made the decision to pursue songwriting after a transformative trip to Israel with the Nesiya Institute. Her music is rich with themes of immigration and displacement, literature and biblical stories, and keen observations of everyday life. Notable tracks include: "Samson," "Après Moi," and "Better."

**Ofra Haza:** Born to Yemenite Jewish immigrant parents in Tel Aviv, Ofra Haza experienced marginalization at a young age due to her Mizrahi heritage during a time when Israeli society was dominated by the Ashkenazi establishment. She began performing in local children's theater troupes and rose to international prominence when she placed second in the 1983 Eurovision Song Contest. Her music is deeply rooted in her Yemenite heritage and explores themes of the immigrant experience, cultural preservation, and innovation. Notable tracks include: "Chai," "Im Nin'alu," and "Deliver Us."

These three women barely scratch the surface of Jewish women's contributions to music. Throughout history, Jewish women have made their mark across countless industries — and the music world is no exception. Happy International Women's Day!
