WHAT I LEARNED ON MY SABBATICAL

The Shalom Hartman Institute is a leading center of Jewish thought and education. Its mission is to strengthen Jewish peoplehood, identity, and pluralism; to enhance the Jewish and democratic character of Israel. The SHI addresses this vision through innovative and creative thinking, gifted and visionary leaders, and transformational education programs such as the RTS (Rabbinic Torah Seminar).

For over a decade I knew that I identified with their vision, for over a decade I have been hearing nothing but praises about the RTS from colleagues and yet, I never brought myself to participate. There was always an excuse, always a reason for why not. It took a personal invitation from Rabbi Donniel Hartman during our meeting at TJ this past winter, and the blessing of a mini-sabbatical I was able to take this summer, to finally take advantage and experience this incredible program.

And so, for 12 days in early July, I found myself, with over 200 other Rabbis from all over the world (From Germany to Australia, Israel to Canada, and of course many colleagues from the US) immersed in study; listening to some of the best scholars and teachers available, engaging in text study, lectures, workshops and excursions on a level I have never experienced previously.

I believe we are all familiar and agree with the idea that "we should learn something new every day" - but in all honesty, how many of us truly do so? How many of us take the time and make the effort? How many of us push ourselves out of our comfort zones and challenge ourselves to rigorously study complicated ideas? I will honestly say that it has been a while since I engaged in such deep study, on such a high level, and I am so grateful for this experience that reminded me how much I love to study and that has now reinstalled in me a renewed understanding and commitment to keep making learning a high priority. Every evening, after leaving the SHI, I found myself with an enthusiasm that even surprised me - sharing all my new insights with anyone that was around and willing to listen.

A typical day at RTS begins with a "Shiur"- a lesson, delivered by a different faculty member. Each teacher starts with a 30-minute introduction to their class (in which they introduce the texts they have chosen and give students some tips as to how we should approach these texts) after which we split into a "Chevruta" (a study group that can be any size from 2 to 5-6 Rabbis) - we would then spend about 1.5 hours studying the text and the come back for a closing lecture. And once again, I can't exaggerate in sharing with you the amazing experience of meeting so many extraordinary colleagues and the importance of continually building a circle of people you can consult with, learn from, and share such experiences with. I met rabbis ranging in age, gender, positions, life experience, denomination and so much more. You see, not growing up in the US in the circles of Reform Judaism, going at a much later age to HUC, and coming directly from there to TJ - limited my exposure to other rabbis. The experience at SHI has helped me develop new and promising relationships with some of the most interesting rabbis I have ever met, and I have no doubt that as these relationships grow and strengthen - you too will have an opportunity to meet some of these scholars. Maybe more than anything else the entire experience was a humbling experience - giving me a much wider perspective to the rich and diverse world of rabbinic opinions and experiences out there.

I must say I was especially impressed by a group of rabbis who were ordained by the SHI in a program called "the Israeli Rabanut" which is basically meant for what we would otherwise call secular Israelis for whom religion is best described as "Israeli" - but more about that another time.

While the experience of studying and the sense of community accompanying it were awesome - the actual studies themselves were nothing short of fascinating - the theme this year was called: "Why Israel?" A simple yet extremely complicated question. Each faculty member was asked to present a different approach, a different understanding to the question of not only what is the role that Israel plays in our lives as Jews (both in Israel and outside of Israel) - but also - why is this question and answer to it so important and/or relevant to us?

And so, among so many we heard from - Elana Stein Hain about the idea of Zionism as a Covenantal Theology, from Micah Goodman about Israel on the world stage, from Yehuda Kurtzer about Israel as a post holocaust theological creation and from Donniel Hartman about Zionism and Power and what Israel can teach us about the gift and danger of power. I will be sharing with you - over the coming year many of the great ideas and lessons I had the privilege to learn.

The afternoon sessions were dedicated to electives. My only criticism of RTS is that having to make a decision between the various options was a cruel and painful experience. I ended up studying the question of "The Uniqueness of Humans" with and an elective about "Shir Ha'shirim" The scroll known as the "Song of Songs" taught in Hebrew - I can't wait until next Passover (traditionally the time we read this scroll) to share some of the insights.

Evenings were dedicated to "big ideas." Whether it was a lecture or being in the audience in a recording of a podcast - the RTS program made sure we would go to bed thinking about what we just heard.

A whole day was dedicated to an excursion aimed at better understanding a moral issue facing Israel - I chose to join the trip to East Jerusalem, trying to better understand the complexity of what it means to be an "East Jerusalemite permanent resident of Israel" - I have to admit that I was surprised to learn, that even as person who spent 30 years living in Jerusalem, there was so much I never knew or realized about what was happening in this beloved city of mine.

The two weeks of RTS ended very fast and with a great sense of inspiration and renewal I was ready to continue with the second part of my sabbatical - spending quality time with family and friends and doing so while forcing myself to temporarily disconnect from my day-to-day work at Temple. You see, usually when I go to Israel, I stay connected, be it via text, email or phone, I speak to both to you - my congregants and to my fellow professionals and leadership, I stay updated with all that is happening, I participate in meetings and in other occasions be it life cycle events, I teach, I occasionally even lead services from Israel - but not this time. This summer my goal was to let go, to allow myself to fully be present in being here and in creating memories with family and friends. It was a very special experience for me, not easy at all, I had to rewire some behaviors that have become second nature habits for me, I had to let go, I had to focus on the here, and now, I had to relearn to fill my time, and mind and soul with things that were not mostly temple related, maybe the best example is how Fridays feel different being away from TJ and how challenging and rewarding was the experience of welcoming Shabbat in very new and creative ways.

And so even the two weeks I spent in Europe with my kids and the 3 weeks in Israel - were very different than any one of my past experiences in Israel.

This ability to disconnect from my day-to-day life truly and fully, could have not happened without an amazing team who took charge while I was away. I feel blessed to have such a trustworthy, hardworking, committed, and devoted team, for if they were not such an incredible team, this entire experience could not have taken place. From the bottom of my heart, I thank Rabbi Feivel and Cantor Abbie who took over all my responsibilities this summer. I can't thank Morli enough, for her hard work and for her sensitivity and wisdom in knowing how to help me make the best out of this time. I am of course grateful for our entire staff who are so good at what they do and make things look so easy that we often forget how hard they work and finally to our leadership for their love, support and vision in understanding the importance of taking this time and to you - my TJ family for your patience, for your love and support and for being the most amazing spiritual home one can possibly ask for, a home I am so happy and excited to continue to serve with renewed vision, passion, energy and devotion.

I'm so happy to be back as part of the team at Temple Judea and even more excited about my new role which will be coordinating Temple Judea's social action efforts for members of all ages as well as creating and kicking off TJ's new young professional networking for 20/30 year olds.

For the past five years, I loved serving as the rabbi for Hillel at Florida Atlantic University, which gave me great insight into the mindset of Jewish young adults today. I learned that while they may be interested in connecting to Judaism, they often felt intimidated due to fears that they weren't "Jewish enough" or that they are "bad Jews." By really learning about their anxieties, goals, and dreams, I created programming that met their needs, and provided a warm and welcoming culture of inclusion. Most importantly, I learned that through personal engagement and relationship building, students became much more open to exploring Jewish tradition, learning, and spirituality. I'm also very passionate about making a difference through acts of tikkun olam- healing our world. As a rabbinical student, I attended a two-week trip to Senegal to help the local community build safer and more secure plumbing for their families. One night, our group felt

disheartened by all the poverty and illiteracy around us. Although we were helping this one community, there were so many others whose needs we weren't addressing. In response, our group leader made us all close our eyes and reflect on the question, "What keeps you up at night?" We resolved to focus on the issue in our world we just couldn't ignore- and we committed to taking action on that one issue when we arrived back home. I will always remember that question, because with all the problems before us today, we could understandably just put up our hands and say, "where can we even begin, and can anything we do actually make a difference!?" When I feel this way, I'm inspired by the wisdom of our tradition, which teaches, "It is not your responsibility to finish the work of perfecting the world, but you are not free to desist from it." (Pirke Avot 2:21). So, I now ask you- What keeps you up at night? Are you ready to start making a difference right here in our local community? This year at Temple Judea, we will begin living our Jewish values by volunteering together on a regular basis. I look forward to coordinating with local organizations to plan meaningful and accessible volunteer activities each month - and I look forward to seeing you there! 

Elul is the last month of the Jewish year and the final month prior to Rosh Hashanah, the Jewish new year. This is a month in which to spiritually prepare for the High Holiday season of reflection and repentance.

Elul is traditionally a time of introspection and personal stock-taking, known in Hebrew as *cheshbon hanefesh*—literally "an accounting of the soul." This process is conducted in preparation for Rosh Hashanah when, Jewish tradition teaches, all of humanity is called to account and a divine judgment is issued.

MODERN MUSSAR

How to be Happier, Kinder & More Content ... No Kidding!

Mussar is the ancient Jewish practice of refining one's middot, or character traits, with origins going back to ancient texts. For many years, studying character traits and good behaviors were often ignored in the traditional yeshivas in favor of Talmud/law study.

The Modern Mussar movement was founded in Europe in response to a perception that Jews had become too focused on rote mitzvah observance at the expense of deliberate ethical behaviors.

This is a two-part class. While many sources will be used and referenced, the class is asked to buy "Everyday Holiness" by Alan Morinis, which will be our primary text. If you missed Part One, you can still participate but you will need to do some pre-work. Please contact the office!

Part Two will run 13 weeks - Beginning SEPTEMBER 8th on Thursdays at 10:45 a.m.

Each week we will engage with a different Middah/trait as outlined in "Everyday Holiness".

We will discover that while we all share common traits, we all have them in different measures.

This will lead each participant to their own path towards spiritual and personal refinement, and we'll begin that journey together.

In fairness to the people who start at the beginning, anyone who misses Part One but wants to join Part Two will need to read all the material we cover in Part One, and possibly attend a "catch-up" session
